had so much fun! I even interned at Filoli Gardens for a summer working alongside professional gardeners in a formal garden setting. I was one of the oldest interns and am grateful they allowed me to work with them. It was also when I realized my hearing wasn't so good, and wondered why they didn't let me do much ladder work.

It was during this time I applied to be a Master Gardener. This was while I was still in the Bay Area of California, and they are organized a bit differently down there. You had to first contact them to register to attend an orientation meeting. You had to go to this meeting before you could apply. The first year I tried I was out in the garden and forgot until it was too late, and I missed the meeting. That meant I had to wait until the following year. So, another year goes by, I get to the meeting early this time, I get my application in right away, I get interviewed and before I was accepted my family situation changed and I moved to Oregon. Still not a Master Gardener.

You might wonder why I wanted so much to be a Master Gardener. Short answer, the people. Longer answer, it is a way to give back with like-minded folks that enjoy lifelong learning and appreciate science-based knowledge. One of the first things I did when I moved to Oregon was to apply to become a Master Gardener. I moved here in February of 2018 and was in training that spring. It has almost been six years and I have made this organization one of the highlights of my life. I have met some good friends and continue to learn and share about gardening. I hope to continue to do so, but maybe with hearing aids."

Grow an Extra Row Giving & Learning Garden - Winter Update



Under the direction of Kirk Pearson many winter tasks have been taking place for the 2024 growing season. Tools inventoried and stored, crop selection finalized, and seeds purchased. Purchasing seed provides our garden with a larger variety and selection of vegetables that will thrive in our Willamette

Valley. This is a huge cost savings for the chapter.

Some of the seeds will be made into seed tape. Seed tape is an effective method to disperse small and hard to handle seeds. It is also a cost and time saver. The tape is simply laid in a shallow trench and covered lightly with soil. After germination, there is less thinning of seedlings necessary because the seeds have already been regulated and spaced properly. The cost saving is simple, fewer wasted seeds.

Seed tape preparations for the GAER garden will begin on March 13 at a hands-on workshop at the extension office annex, with all the materials and seeds ready to go. (Time TBA) If you want to help, please contact Priscilla Robinson or Wendy Wilson. There will be other pre-season work parties-if you want to get involved, please contact Kirk Pearson.

April 2nd at 9am will be our first workday at the Clackamas Community College Community Gardens. If you want to learn and grow with us, all are welcome. Bring small hand garden tools, gloves, and your own water bottle. Finally, much appreciation from all the GAER team goes to Nancy Muir and Eve Freeman! They continue to mentor this humble group, ensuring a smooth transition for the 2024 growing season. Nancy left us with a meek moto, "Come when you can, stay as long as you want".




